

Aiden Carver and Audra Walmsley get autographs from Lissa Price.


Aiden Carver (8th grade) *Library RaT*



There were funny comments, read-outs, and nobody said that the ideas were crazy. Convolution, sentient radishes, and cheesy romantic comedies were the letter of the day. Despite complicated analogies, there was a sense of ridiculous fun. His humor is seen in *A Tale Dark and Grimm*, with many fractured fairy tales told by a shocked and sarcastic narrator and the worst secret-keeping crows in the world!



He even told us that, "I knew someone who was writing a book, and when I went to ask him how it was going, he told me he hadn't written anything for six months. That he never had the time. But let me tell you something: *You always have the time to write.*"

This year there were food trucks we got to eat at instead of bringing our own lunches. My friends and I all waited in the hamburger line, talking about our morning and laughing. We also got shaved ice which was a nice treat. They had so many flavors. I hope they have even more choices next year.

The third workshop we attended had us hanging on the author's every word. Benjamin Sáenz was a man of words who had everyone crying by the time the workshop was done. He explained to us that you don't have to stick with your first idea for a story. Keep trying out different versions of the same story and soon you will find the best one for you.

Our final workshop was with Jennifer Donnelly. She mentioned the different types of ‘monsters’ while writing a story and explained how you can resolve them. She told us about how you shouldn't tell a character who they are, you should listen to them and they will tell you about themselves. Then build off of what they tell you and you can make your setting and other characters that correspond with his/her lives.

Overall, we love Cavalcade and want to go every year and come back to chaperone for Ms. Sara when we finish high school.






